#### Message from our CEO

Here we are, half way through the year already! Sometimes it feels like we are running on the spot and getting nowhere, so these newsletters are a great opportunity to step back and look around at how far we have come. It is truly wonderful to be able to report that we are a growing ministry.

Through the hard work and faithful, prayerful, obedience of a great many people over a considerable period of time we will this year run new Kairos Inside short courses at the Port Augusta Prison in South Australia, Correctional Centre at Wolston, Dawn De Loas Correctional Centre (part of the Silverwater complex) in Sydney. In addition there will

be two new Kairos Outside for Women groups running their first weekends this year in North Queensland and New England in New South Wales. And we will run another Kairos Outside for Men weekend in Sydney. Praise God!

So, really, this is a very busy year.

In April, I had the privilege of meeting with around 20 Kairos volunteers who have taken on some of the leadership roles in the organisation, and spent the weekend discussing the ministry and the many challenges we face this year and looking into the future. We will shortly be able to share with you some of the outcomes, after we have analysed all that was discussed and formulated practical responses.

In the last Newsletter I wrote about the passion and compassion of Kairos volunteers and I have continued to be confronted by that great compassion that Kairos volunteers show in their lives, and choose to live out through the Kairos ministry. In thinking about this I was reminded of some of the writings of Neil Cole in his book "Organic Church" and in particular the passage in Matthew Chapter 9 v 36: "When He saw the crowds, He was deeply moved with compassion for them, because they were troubled and helpless, like sheep

without a shepherd."

Neil Cole makes two points:

1) The Greek word translated here as compassion really refers to a physical, gut response, and

2) The scriptures tell us that God intentionally placed us in certain relational contexts by His providence. This puts the responsibility on us to see the people in our lives as there by design, and challenges us to take advantage of opportunities to share the kingdom of God with them.

Most of us are surrounded daily by crowds of people who do not have Christ in their lives, yet we walk through life without feeling it in

our guts. Why? Because we don't see them as Jesus does.

It is comforting to know that in the midst of our hectic lives, Jesus can understand and empathise with us, however, when Jesus saw the crowds he had gut wrenching compassion.

When I'm busy I tend to run past other people

without a second glance. I get frustrated at slow cars in front of me, queues and traffic jams. Obstacles to my progress.

But Jesus didn't see the crowds as an obstacle to his mission, he saw them as his mission, and he FELT compassion for them. FELT compassion is a clue to the depth of his caring.

So now we can perhaps start to understand what compassion is NOT:

- Compassion is not mere sympathy. It is not just feeling for your pain.
- It is not empathy putting yourself in someone else's position.
- It is not agreement being politically correct at the expense of being Biblically correct.
- It is not pity. Pity leads to despair; compassion leads to hope.

Someone has said pity weeps and walks away; compassion comes to help and to stay.

Pity often produces the tears that keep us a safe distance away from another person's problem.

Pity observes; compassion involves.

Thank you for your compassion towards those imprisoned, both on the inside and the outside.

On a more practical note, the Board has decided that, come what may, we will vacate the Parramatta office by June 30th. We still continue to look for suitable alternative accommodation within Correctional Services or other government facilities, or through our church contacts, as well as commercial leases, however, so far without success. So please continue to pray for our future accommodation, that wherever the Lord wants us to be will be revealed to us in due time, in His special time.

Kairos #13 was recently held at Fulham prison in Sale Victoria on the 1st – 4th May. We were privileged to have 14 guests attend the course as well as five helpers who had participated in earlier Kairos courses.

Although Fulham was experiencing some union unrest and random strike action, God richly blessed us, and the turmoil had no effect on the course whatsoever.

Sharing by the guests at the closing was

very encouraging and it was evident that God was and is still working in the lives of those who participated – and as one of the leaders commented "The Holy Spirit can be very subtle in how he achieves his way with us and I had a great sense of him working his gift of grace and mercy during our time at Fulham"

#### KI ACACIA # 3 WA

"It's the best thing I ever done!" This was the assessment of Acacia Prison's "Kairos 3" by one of the men who took part. He



said this when he dropped in to see me in my office this morning. He added, "I'm really looking forward to the followup program...."

Acacia's 3rd short-course took place from May 7- 10th (inclusive). And what a truly remarkable program it was! 18 prisoners participated, and 17 visitors from "outside".

In many ways, it was an answer to prayer. Quite a number of these guys have never experienced genuine community before, and it's not something that's readily available in the prison environment. I believe that "Kairos" is a profound influence in the lives of some of these men - seeds are sown which may later be extremely fruitful.

I'm intensely aware that some of the team had to take time off work to be here - also that others travelled long distances, and that almost all took two weekends away from home in order to train and prepare for this venture. I am grateful for all their efforts, and I look forward to "Kairos 4" in a year's time.....

# A chance encounter

Sometimes God blesses us by allowing us to see the fruit of our commitment.

#### NEW KO North Qld!

At last, after forming an ad hoc committee three years ago, North Queensland is to host their first Kairos Outside for women weekend in July (6th 7th 8th). There are two correctional centres in North Queensland, one in Townsville, and the other at Lotus Glen on the Atherton Tablelands. These centres cover an area North from Bowen to the Torres Strait (1300kms) and west to Mt Isa

(1000kms), with many inmates coming from very isolated areas. This makes it very hard for families with a loved one behind bars. Some of our committee travel 400 kms to attend a meeting.

We have had great support from our Southern Queensland counterparts who are leading us through our first weekend. Kairos Outside North Queensland #1 will be held at Kennedy, half way between Townsville and Cairns. At our end, Gwen Thomas, our Chair, has been very active in "getting it all together" and she is ably supported by the team.

We would value your prayers before and during the weekend. Many of us are entering unchartered waters, but I am certain that all who participate will be richly blessed.

#### Maddy's Story

Hi, my name is Maddy and I would like to tell you about how going on a Kairos Outside weekend has changed my life.

After finishing Year 12, I did a course in Child Care and worked looking after children for a while before some things happened and my life took a downhill spiral as I got involved with drugs and alcohol. I came to Canberra four years ago to enter detox and try to make a fresh start but it didn't work out very well for me. After I was asked to leave, I found myself homeless for over a year, sleeping in parks and behind hedges as well as staying in refuges around the city before I was able to get my own flat in 2009, where I have lived ever since. It was during this time of being homeless that I found a church where people cared for me and they didn't mind that I had

drifted away from going to church as I did when I was younger.

I live with depression but when I went on the Kairos Outside weekend it made such a big difference in my life. Being part of KO really brightens me up. I go to the coffee groups as often as I can and love going to the reunions too. The best thing about being part of the KO community is meeting new people and not being lonely anymore. The best part of the weekend was feeling accepted and of course all the lovely gifts – it was like all my birthdays and Christmases came at once. It has been especially nice to have people ring me up on my birthday and I enjoy talking to them and try to encourage them too.

Since doing the KO weekend, I have started going to the Australian Catholic University


where I am doing a course in Liberal Studies with some other ladies from KO. We are presently studying Shakespeare. I find it hard but am determined to persevere with it. As well as going to uni I go to two churches where I receive support and help others, do some volunteer work as well as minding a small child each week. I have an active social life - life is looking up and feels good.

He spoke of the dark hole he was in prior to Kairos and how his whole view of life has changed. Praise God for what he does through those letters, prayers and acts of Agape to other residents.

The willingness of team members to

be so readily involved is a blessing and the commitment of Graeme Bell our Chaplain can never be underestimated.

Thank you, Graeme, from all of us. Graeme has made our entry into the goal so much easier.

Please continue to pray for the men who are regulars, that their influence will continue to affect others. As James, a resident has said, he can at this stage only believe what he sees and he has seen great changes in the men who are involved with Kairos.

A strong commitment has been made by new team members to the Journey program and future Kairos Courses. These men were impacted by the uniqueness of this ministry and their contribution brought a freshness and energy to the team which blessed us all. The outside support team was a large and happy family full of joy and prayer for each act of service and support of those who went inside each day. The unity and fun they injected uplifted us morning and night and an excellent relationship of trust was established.

The Closing Service took an unexpected turn when we learned of the arrival of the 34th Governor of SA, His Excellency Rear Admiral Kevin John Scarce AC CSC RANR and his entourage. Added to this was the Mayor of Unley, local MP, Ian Schneider Principal Chaplain, Prison Chaplaincy Services and Dept For Correctional Services as well as DCS Dept heads, Chief Executive Peter Severin, Executive Director Custodial Services David Brown and the new General Manager of

Mobilong Claire Parkinson. The Governor spoke generously to the men and was received well by them. It was his first visit to a SA Prison and we are grateful that he honoured our program by attending.

## Thank you to all our supporters
